

- A program to establish milkweed plants along the Monarch migration routes. The program is administered by The Monarch Watch.
- Monarch butterfly populations have been in serious decline the past 20 years.
- 2500 mile migration from Mexico to Canada in the spring, with a return trip to Mexico in the fall.
- Texas migration passes right through our campus.
- A Waystation can be 4 plants in your backyard to 2 acres of plants on campus.




Declining Population

Get Set and Go!



- Prepping and planting
 - Milkweed, milkweed. Grows like a weed!
 - Nectar and pollen plants to complement the "nursery."
 - Water source.
- Had a student planting kickoff during Earth Week.
- 40 students volunteered to plant 500 4" plants.





- Research Craig can now publish a thesis on establishing butterfly habitat.
- Large clusters of colored flowers can attract butterflies – as opposed to intermingled flowers.




























So, Now You've Got a Waystation

Blossoms



- Applied to the Native Plant Society of Texas for a grant.
- Applied to the Monarch Watch for some seedlings.
- Lesson learned grown your own. Plants should not be sent in the mail.
- Lesson learned don't plant wildflower seeds 2 days before you get 11" of rain. The seeds won't stay where you put them.
