


















2017 – Background

5) College applies for tobacco-free grant


















784 responses*

- 541 students
- 233 employees
- 10 community members
- *88% identified as non-smokers
- *71% say they are exposed to 2nd hand smoke on campus
- *57% want it banned from campus or limited to parking lots
- *More than 24 pages of comments....







Comment themes from the 24 pages...

- Addiction, Behavior or Habit of smoking should be addressed
- Asthma, Health, Cancer, Lung Disease, Head aches from second-hand smoke
- Air Quality, **Pollution**, Litter from poor tobacco management practices
- Location of existing Smoking Areas impacting non-smokers in high-traffic areas
- Electronic Cigarettes or Vapes just as bothersome to nonsmokers

2018 – Background Timeline

• 8) College selects two <u>Health Community Scholars</u> to support effort for a tobacco-free college

- \$2,000 stipend per student over 1.5 years
- Formal training by Truth Initiative and NLC
- Advocacy, Education & Student-Engagement

Project Objectives further described:

- (1)Student Engagement engage at least 2,000 students in student-led tobacco-prevention, education, and campus policy (~10% of population)
- (2) <u>Employee Engagement</u> (Faculty/Staff/Admin) engage at least 200 employees (50% of population)

College Leader Objectives

- Enlist: College leaders should recruit 10-15% of the student population through our text-in system by the end of the grant period. Ex: Text VUU to 88709
- Engage: Execute 4-6 low-intensity advocacy activities during the grant period (areas of tobacco-free environments, tobacco and popular culture, flavors)
- Advocate: one high-intensity advocacy actions (town hall meeting) and two advocacy actions that directly support the national truth public education campaign ad launches (VMAs and Grammys or as identified)









- (3) <u>Marketing & Public Information</u> engage the college using posters, social media and online content, and host at least 3 education workshops for healthier lifestyles and cessation activities supported by community organizations
- (4) <u>Sustainability, Health & Wellness</u> support tobacco-free goals for outdoor activities, environmental quality, and health and wellness.
- (5) <u>Policy Development</u> support DCCCD efforts for a DCCCD Tobacco-Free policy and college-level implementation at North Lake College

Tobacco use is not only a health issue — it is also an environmental issue.

30-40%

Since the 1980s, cigarette butts have consistently comprised 30 - 40% of all items collected in annual international coastal and urban cleanups.

Truth Initiative founded in 1999, and funded in part by the 1998 "Master Settlement Agreement" –

- "an accord reached in November 1998 between the state Attorneys General of 46 states, five U.S. territories, the District of Columbia and the five largest tobacco companies in America concerning the advertising, marketing and promotion of tobacco products."
- "In addition to requiring the tobacco industry to pay the settling states approximately \$10 billion annually for the indefinite future, the MSA also set standards for, and imposed restrictions on, the sale and marketing of cigarettes by participating cigarette manufacturers.


